The Chairman's Column



HELLO AGAIN and belated Happy New Year. Conversely, it is the end of our committee's year and a very successful year it was. Our A.G.M. is scheduled for Monday, February 22, 1999. (Put it in your diary).

PEOPLES MEMORIES are generally hazy on little success stories and very clear on little failures. It will therefore, quickly recap on our committees' successes during 1998.

COMMUNITY GAMES: the first Beaumont entry in many years. Apart from winning four medals, the games were very enjoyable for all involved. Thanks to Ann Maher, Irene Molloy and their team for their great work.

SENIOR CITIZENS CHRISTMAS PARTY: Organised by Noreen Maher and her team. This was a super party and an unqualified success. Special thanks to the local businesses for their generous support and to Garda Stephen Daly for providing the transport. It should be noted that this was a free party for Senior Citizens.

SANTA CLAUS, accompanied by two very attractive helpers a clown and four Telly Tubbies visited more than 70 children in their own homes just before Christmas. It brought all of us involved, back to our childhood for an afternoon. A very pleasant experience.

COOLGREENA CLOSE PARK: A budget of £30,000 was eventually approved by the Corporation for the Development of the Park. Work is scheduled to be carried out in 1999. The full details of the improvements are soon to be finalised. Residents of Coolgreena Close should take particular note.

TRAFFIC IMPROVEMENT measures were introduced, new traffic lights incorporating a 'wrap-around' pedestrian phase, were installed at Beaumont Road/Dromawling Road/Sbantalla Road Junction. This has alleviated a major hazard for very many pedestrians. In January of this year we received approval for a traffic island and the incorporation of a pedestrian phase in the existing traffic lights at the Beaumont Woods junction. Our committee advised the Corporation, the local Public Representatives and Castlethorn Construction of our intention to block their junction to ensure the safe crossing of our school children. Its amazing what can be achieved when one "hits where it hurts". There are a number of other traffic calming measures in the pipeline.

TIDY DISTRICTS Competition: We did not win any prizes - but we did make an impact on the ground. While the improvements were patchy in places it showed clearly in other areas what a bit of effort can achieve.

COOLGREENA ROAD ACCESS to St. Paul's school is a long running problem and it is expected to be resolved shortly. Planning Permission was granted to St. Paul's for an extension on the condition that this gate be closed. Construction is planned for later this year.

BEAUMONT NEWS is maturing all the time and has carved

ique spot close to the hearts of the residents. Barry Doyle worked long hours and on occasions burned the "midnight oil", compiling and editing and producing it. I have no doubt, he will continue his great work next year.

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH was very active throughout the year under the stewardship of Gerry Hiney. Gerry and his team will shortly bring to fruition a major initiative for senior citizens in the form of subsidised alarms and security systems. There was an enormous amount of 'Red Tape' involved with this project and the team spent many late nights getting the paperwork in order. The scheme is funded by the government and administered by the Gardai. Thanks to Garda Stephen Daly for his help with this also. In general communications between Santry Gardai and our Neighbourhood Watch team is excellent. OUR AGM is scheduled for Monday next and I am asking for a big "turn-out". Most of our committee members are offering themselves for re-election - the exceptions being Sean Dooley (Treasurer) and myself. Sean has moved from Beaumont a few months ago. I thank him for continuing to do the treasurers job 'till the end of his term. That's loyalty and dedication. For my own part, I have taken on additional work responsibilities and together with personal and family commitments, leaves me with not enough time to adequately fulfil the Chairman's role. In any event, I believe it is time for "new blood". The Residents Association is now in a very healthy unified state and the committee is like a well lubricated locomotive. They are more than able to deliver effectively, what you the residents want. I know I'll miss the phone calls, the monthly meetings and the adjournments to 'Beaumont House'. I am privileged to have met, served and befriended so many nice people, I hope I can retain their friendships. The Committee members are a great gang and deserve your support. Be sure to come along to the AGM. If you like (or dislike) what we are doing, come along and tell us.

HELLO AGAIN, the festive season is over and we are well into another year. As I sit here to write this issue's column I shudder to think that there are only 348 shopping days left till next Christmas. It seems to come quicker every year. On a serious note I hope you all enjoyed yourselves and I wish you all a Happy New Year. Moving on -

Good news with regard to the grants for the elderly. The grants have been passed and all applicants have been notified. However, the Neighbourhood Watch Committee has requested that all outstanding applications be forwarded by Friday Feb. 12, 1999. The Contractors will be calling on all applicants over the next week or so. A quick word of caution - all contractors will have identity cards with them and residents are advised to request I.D. before admitting any contractor into their home. Should you have any doubt about the identity of any contractor do not let them into your home and contact the Gardai.

In my last column, I mentioned operation Graffiti Clean-up. I am pleased to announce that Dublin Bus have informed us of a notable decrease in vandalism on busses in the area since the project was launched. So keep up the good work. This project was launched as part of the Garda Schools Programme. The Schools Programme covers the following topics: (1) The Gardai and their role in society (2) Vandalism (3) Personal Safety (4) Road Safety (5) Cycle Safety.

The aim of the Schools Programme is to teach children sensible and responsible patterns of behaviour in order that they may (1) Be safer on the roads and in the home (2) Reduce the risks they may face through crime (3) Develop positive attitudes towards the Gardai and to understand the job they do (4) Make a positive contribution to crime prevention.

The Schools Programme in the 'H' District is implemented by the Community Police Unit and involves a series of presentations by Gardai to Fifth Class schoolchildren in Primary schools covering the above mentioned topics. Should any parent or Guardian wish to know more about the schools programme, they can contact any member of the Community Police Unit in Santry and we will be happy to discuss it with you.

Finally, if there is anyone out there who would like to join Victim Support or would like to know more about it, there is a meeting at 8 p.m. on 10th February, 1999 in Santry Garda Station. All are welcome. I will be covering the subject of Victim Support in my next column.

Father Joe's Column



The weeks are really flying by aren't they? It is hard to believe that we are well into 1999 now - it will be 2000 before we know it! The Jubilee Group had a follow-up evening in January. They are planning a series of talks to take place on Tuesday Evenings during Lent.

Preparations are well in hand for our Confirmations which take place on the 12th. and 13th. of March. This year there is an added element in the preparations as students from Mercy College Beaumont are acting as Faith Friends for the boys and girls making their Confirmation. The first meeting of the Faith Friends took place on Tuesday, the 26th. of January and there will be a number of such meetings before the Confirmation Ceremony in March. The role of the Faith Friend is to offer friendship and support for the people preparing for Confirmation. Please keep the young people preparing for Confirmation in your prayers.

The Second Classes are busy preparing for First Communion and First Confession. The First Confessions take place on Wednesday, the 10th. of March. This is a very special time for the boys and girls of Second Class and we wish them and their families every blessing.

The Citizen Information Service is now firmly established in the Pastoral Centre. They have obtained planning permission for signs on Skelly's Lane and Montrose Ave. which should be a great help in guiding people to their office.

Wednesday, the 17th. of February is Ash Wednesday, the beginning of Lent. In addition to the usual weekday Masses, we will have an extra Mass at 7.15 am. each morning, Monday to Friday, during Lent. This is a time people very often make resolutions to give up things as an act of Penance. This is of course a very good way of doing Penance but there are many other ways. It is a good idea to take a little time to reflect on how you might spend your Lent. Remember the purpose of Penance is not to hurt us but rather to make us more free and more loving and so the measure of a good penance is not how much it hurts but rather how it helps us to grow in life and love and freedom. Like everything else, this involves a certain discipline and commitment and this is where the effort comes in. For some people perhaps getting a walk each day might be a good Lenten exercise, or getting quiet time to reflect and pray or reading from scripture, the possibilities are endless. If at all possible come to daily Mass as the readings chosen for the forty days of Lent are a kind of Retreat or course in preparation for Easter.

Finally, the Annual General Meeting of the Parish Council takes place on Thursday, the 25th. of February at 8.15 PM. in the Pastoral Centre. This is a very important meeting during which members of the incoming Council will be elected. If the Council is to truly reflect the views and needs of the Parish it is essential that as many different people as possible attend so please put the date in your diary and come along.

First the Euro, then the language

The European Commission has just announced an agreement whereby English will be the official language of the EU rather than German, which was the other possibility. As part of the negotiations Her Majesty's Government conceded that English spelling had some room for improvement and has accepted a 5 year phase-in plan that would be known as 'Euro-English'.

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH REPORT - By Noreen Maher

A MEETING was held on Jan. 11 at Santry Garda Station. The Santry Gardai ran a Christmas Party for the whole of 'H' District which we are included in. Six Senior Citizens were picked from each Residents Association. The Party was excellent and very much appreciated by the 60 people who attended it.

A few burglaries occurred in January and also a few muggings. One mugging happened on Coolgarraff Rd. and another one on Dromawling Rd. (near the park). Both had handbags taken from the. One lady was injured and had to go to hospital with a dislocated shoulder. This was a vicious attack. It was reported at the meeting that robberies are more likely to occur during the daytime. At night time when the light is on we should all draw our curtains both back and front - as every move can be watched by an intending burglar.

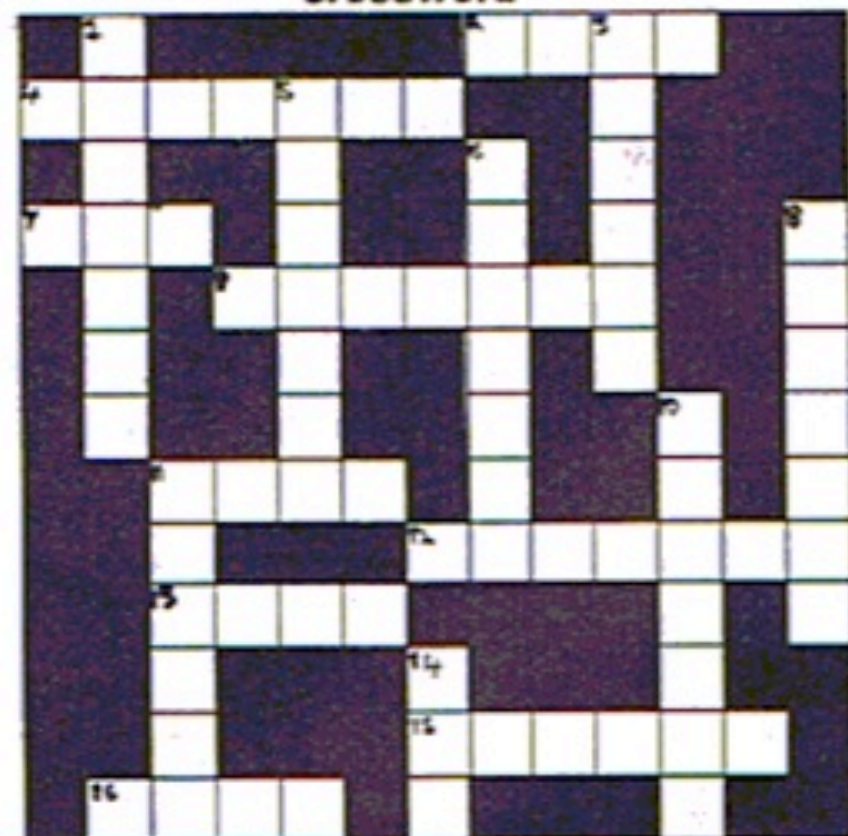
